TRACK YOUR BALLOT

- TrackYour Ballot - Know where your ballot is in the voting process and get a virtual "I Voted" sticker. As a Multnomah County voter, you can sign up to receive alerts via text, phone or email. Know when your ballot is mailed out to you. After you vote and return your ballot, be alerted when it has been accepted for counting.

IMPORTANT DATES

GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 3

- Sept. 18** Military/overseas ballots mailed.
- Sept. 21** Absentee ballots available in Elections office.
- Oct. 5** Out of state ballots mailed.
- Oct. 7-10** Voters' Pamphlet mailed to all residential households by the Oregon Secretary of State's office.
- Oct. 13** Voter Registration deadline
- Oct. 14** Ballots begin to be mailed to voters.
- Oct. 29** Last day to safely return your ballot by mail. After that date voters must use an official drop site.
- Nov. 3** General Election date (Ballots due by 8pm)

WHERE TO TAKE YOUR BALLOT:

Gresham Voting Center Express - There is an official ballot drop box located inside the Voting Center Express on the first floor of the Multnomah East County Building 600 NE 8th st. It is open only the 15 days before each election and only available during voting center open hours. You will need to park and walk inside to deposit your ballot.

The nearest official 24-hour ballot drop box is in the Gresham Library parking lot.

Forgot to mail? Need assistance?

We'll pick up your ballot and drop at the nearest drop site if you are unable. Call to arrange a pick up time.

Citizen Volunteers in Policing (CVIP)

Citizens making a positive difference in our community!

About the CVIP program

Gresham's Citizen Volunteers in Policing (CVIP) are the eyes and ears of the Police Department and create a visible presence in our parks, trails, residential areas and commerce centers.

The CVIP program often accepts applications

online or at the police department's Information and Records window. Completed forms may be mailed to the police department or dropped off at the departments front desk. Call to see when next open position is available to apply.

Volunteers do not carry weapons, confront suspects, or participate in altercations; they observe and report.

In addition, CVIPs:

- Deliver food boxes.
- Participate in community events.
- Report graffiti.
- Patrol along City trails using a Gator mobile.
- Issue handicapped parking citations.
- Deploy the speed radar trailer.
- Assist with curfew sweeps.
- Initiate patrols of residential areas, parks, school grounds and commercial areas.

Volunteer criteria

- Must be 21 years of age and older
- Must live or own a business within the city limits of Gresham
- Must pass a DMV and criminal background check

In addition, an appointment to the program requires attendance at an orientation meeting, followed by an interview with the City's Chief of Police.

Can you afford a **250%** increase in your water bill?

Your water bill will go up, the question is, how much and how can you stop it?

Clean, affordable water is something we've taken for granted in Gresham, and now it's being threatened. It's an issue overlooked by most candidates. I'm running because I'm alert to those types of issues. I look out for threats to our quality of life.

Gresham currently buys it's water wholesale from Portland. With massive infrastructure updates needed on Portland's system, your essential water bill will increase, by a lot. This massive increase could price already vulnerable families out of their homes.

The City of Gresham is tied to Portland's water, and we pay for 10% of the wholesale purchase price. This could go up as much as 250% or more in the next few years. Portland does not control their costs, so whatever they incur, Gresham will be forced to pay. Because Gresham has no ownership in Portland's water, we have no say.

The City Council must make a decision on this water crisis in the near future. Will we fund Portland's 800 million dollar upgrade, or will we find our own way forward at a fraction of the cost?

My experience in budgeting will help Gresham discern the best path forward to achieve water independence from Portland.

In addition, I'll seek to expand federal funding for customer assistance programs to low income families trying to dig out of a covid recession, and on the path to prosperity.

One Vote. You have a powerful vote. This year it's the most important vote in your lifetime. It's your vote, choose Gresham first. **Choose Sue Piazza.**

How did Gresham get its name?

You can thank **Ben F. Rollins**.



In 1884, Rollins built a general store in an area known as "Campground." Thinking a post office would help with the business, Rollins wrote to Postmaster General Walter Q. Gresham. Gresham served in the Union army and also in the Indiana legislature.

We can't say for certain whether Rollins suggested naming the area after Gresham to flatter the General into fulfilling his request, or if he named the area after Gresham as a thank-you for acquiring the post office. But, apparently, other towns had the same idea; there are eight other cities in the U.S. named Gresham!

Zimmerman House Museum is home to thousands of artifacts from Gresham's pioneer days. The 1874 farmhouse is located on a remnant parcel of the original Zimmerman family dairy farmstead that once extended over 600 acres along the Columbia River. The historic building was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1986.
